A guide to welcoming Ukrainian children and families

Welcoming an EAL child to an early years setting is a wonderful thing! As with all aspects of early years care and education, careful planning is crucial to make the experience and transition supported and positive.

Since the start of the conflict in February 2022, welcoming Ukrainian refugee families into our community has become a priority. Some families in the UK are preparing to host families, while some families are already here. Some might have links already in the UK, but many won't. Each family will be different.

This guide offers advice and information to prepare for refugee families from Ukraine and to signpost to further resources.



When welcoming a child into an early years setting, positive wellbeing and emotional health is essential.

Children and families may have experienced trauma such as:

- Traumatic or distressing experiences in their country of origin
- Traumatic experiences on arrival in the UK
- Significant grief and anxiety resulting from loss
- Isolation and loneliness in the UK





Settings can:

- Provide a sense of safety
- Reassure them
- Think together about what helps them cope with difficult feelings
- Spend quality time doing things the child enjoys
- Validate their feelings
- Offer a home visit with their host family (there are translated resources to assist with this)

Encourage the parent to stay with the child to help them settle for as long as is needed.

There is Ukrainian or Russian speaking support via DA Languages and Diversity Voice, who can support with this as well as translating documents.
